It has been a super week with some lovely opportunities to work with the children in Croft Class. Both classes have relished this time together.

This week as historians we have looked back at the coronation of King Charles 3rd sharing our memories and remembering what a significant event it was. We also looked at his family tree and we discussed how succession works.

London has been the focus of our geography lesson. As we explore this vibrant city, we note its human and physical features and its famous landmarks.

Amazing bridges have been designed and built this week. The children worked hard to follow their designs with much success.

Exploring magnets has been our focus in science and the EYFS children have also had the opportunity to explore magnetism with a fishing game that they added to with their own magnetic sea creatures.

Our whole school attendance is currently 95.6%


